Michelle Mischkulnig is a Melbourne-based textile artist who creates highly detailed and colourful artworks inspired by the places she has been, and the emotions she feels. Mischkulnig creates vibrant textile pieces which draw inspiration from the lush Australian landscapes around her. In her artwork she integrates the formal elements of color and texture, making each piece a personal reflection of her artistic journey.

Mischkulnig's work is not a literal copy of what she sees in front of her – it is inspired by how she feels in her heart. This allows her to work fluidly and intuitively when making her pieces and means that each textile piece evolves and changes as she is making it.

Mischkulnig's artistic process develops from observation and experience. She is inspired by her surroundings, often drawing from the landscapes and environments she encounters. This environment can be urban spaces, rural landscapes, or even abstracted interpretations of nature.

Mischkulnig's artistic style explores vibrant colours and intricate layering. Her keen eye for detail allows her to use diverse materials, from natural fibers to reclaimed textiles to create rich, textured pieces. By blending traditional techniques with modern aesthetics, she crafts not just textile art, but narratives that invite viewers to connect with their own stories.

- Mischkulnig studied Textile Design at RMIT (Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology) from 1979 –

Michelle's process begins with research and inspiration from her surroundings. She often documents her observations through sketches and photographs, which inform her fabric choices and narrative direction.

Research and Inspiration: Michelle immerses herself in her environment, gathering inspiration from nature, architecture, and everyday life.

Material Selection: With a commitment to sustainability, Mischkulnig carefully selects materials that hold personal significance. The history of each textile plays an important part in the narrative she weaves, reminding audiences of the relationships we share with the objects around us.

Textile Techniques: Employing techniques like quilting, embroidery, and dyeing, she layers stories within the fabric. Each stitch and color choice contributes to the overall meaning, creating depth and exploration.

A prominent aspect of her art is the use of symbols and motifs that resonate with personal stories. This approach not only makes her work accessible but encourages viewers to find their own connections within her narratives.



When talking about her textile art, Michelle Mischkulnig says:

I am inspired by places I have been and places I wish to visit; the colours, the textures, the emotion, needing to feel their rhythm, drawn to their conversation, enthralled by their colour and texture.

I am inspired by the everyday that holds beauty and captivation; watching the seasons change, listening and laughing with friends and family, the roar of the ocean. I hope to convey the colour and movement of how I respond emotionally.

At the heart of Mischkulnig's work is an exploration of identity, place, and the connections we have with our environment. Mischkulnig's artistic practice explores the relationships between light, atmosphere, and the natural world.

She aims to create a dialogue between her art and the viewer, prompting questions about the narratives held within each textile piece. Through her use of colour, texture and subjects, Mischkulnig is able to convey emotions in fabric.

Each piece of fabric and thread in her work is part of the story that she is trying to share, and this aspect not only makes her work relatable but also allows viewers to find their own meanings within it.

Mischkulnig's work is often characterized by a dynamic contrast of abstraction and representation. If you look at her work you may notice some things you recognise (familiar forms) intertwined with abstract elements. Mischkulnig often integrates motifs of natural forms – such as flora and geometric shapes inspired by landscapes -but abstracts them in a way that challenges the viewer's understanding of what is real.
